Literacy and the Library

PA Forward, a new initiative of the Pennsylvania Library Association, was created to give voice to what the library community already knows: With the right support, libraries are ideally positioned to become the community centers of information, technology, and learning that will fuel educational and economic opportunity for all citizens.

Libraries are no longer just buildings that house books. Today's libraries are agile institutions serving real-life needs. They hold the key to powering progress and elevating the quality of life in Pennsylvania by supporting the types of knowledge essential to success: Basic Literacy, Information Literacy, Civic and Social Literacy, Health Literacy, and Financial Literacy.



Basic literacy encourages higher literacy rates, a trained and skilled workforce, and a growing economy, tax base, and popula-

Information literacy helps people learn how to use current technology to improve their education, to enhance their job skills and to develop their personal lives.

Civic and social literacy helps citizens have the knowledge and skills they need to improve their lives, to participate and contribute effectively to their community, government, and society and to connect with one another through discourse.

Health literacy helps citizens manage their own and their family's well-being, and empower them to be effective partners with their healthcare providers so they can live longer, more productive lives.

Financial literacy helps people become informed consumers and guide individuals, small businesses, and other organizations to contribute to the economic vitality of their community through innovation, entrepreneurship, and economic development.

The Lititz Public Library has long supported the five key literacies through its collections, programs and online resources and will continue to take an active role in helping to make a real difference in peoples' lives.

Health Information Access Project Supporting Health Literacy

Did you know that the Library System of Lancaster County teamed up with the county hospitals and the United Way to create the Health Information Access Project? The project was designed to provide reliable health information to county residents in a variety of forms, including an online Web portal for reliable health information; special programming provided by the hospitals; additional resource books on consumer health/wellness at the public libraries and hospital health libraries; and printed information in the form of flyers and brochures that are distributed throughout the county at public libraries, hospitals, and other designated locations. Grant money and corporate partners helped fund this project.

New Digital Projector Installed!

The library's community room now has new digital projector to show films and computer presentations. Clair Brothers installed the new widescreen projector, along with a new screen that is sized to accommodate the wider projection for-



mat. Al Winters, service technician with Clair Brothers, noted that the old projector, installed when the library was built in 1999 and not working properly, was well past its prime. The new projector uses a laser and LED as a hybrid light source, so that no warm up or cool down of a bulb is necessary. The new hybrid light technology is rated at approximately 20,000 hours of use. Clair Brothers helped the library by providing the projector at a reduced cost.
